


The Community That Is Holy Trinity by Rev. Bruce McPherson, Interim Rector

The community that is Holy Trinity has many faces, lives and works in many places and is active in many different phases of Parish life. This community consists of members who have formally joined the ranks of Communicants in Good Standing and many who are not formally members but are faithful in worship. And this community includes the Day School and all who are part of it: students, their families and its many supporters. Holy Trinity is a community without walls.

Above everything else, Holy Trinity is a community of faith. Everyone who is part of us is on his/her own personal and particular journey, a journey which brings each person closer and closer to God. This journey for some includes only participation in worship, for others it includes only participation in the social life of the parish and for most, the journey includes both. Most support Holy Trinity financially and many with volunteer time. This community does not have rigid boundaries, but rather its boundaries are soft and indistinct. This is because no single person's journey is more or less valid than another's. Every person and his/her life's journey is sacred; not any one more than any other one. There has never been a time that was more sacred than this time, nor a place that was more sacred than this place. Holy Trinity is itself on a sacred journey; a journey that will bring new leadership, a journey that will bring new life, a journey that will bring all its members and friends into a closer relationship with God as God is revealed in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Holy Trinity is a Christian community, not because it is a part of the world-wide Anglican Communion, thought that is true, but because it is a part of the journey of so many who in various ways come to know Christ. Faith in Christ opens for us the possibility of knowing more about God, which is to say, more about the meaning and purpose of life and of death. Jesus Christ is about life and death. And Christ is revealed in scripture, in prayer and, perhaps most vividly, in the faces of all those who are part of the Community That Is Holy Trinity, no matter what the level of their participation. Every time someone new joins his/her journey with that of this community, Christ is more fully revealed. Because our boundaries are imprecise, even porous, it is our mandate, our command, to welcome the stranger. Every time we do, we welcome Christ himself.

At the conclusion of each Vestry meeting we pray, "Give us the grace to accept the Christ who comes in your name and the courage to be the Christ for others. Amen"

Dominique took pictures of each grave stone in the Church Cemetery and the Oden Bowie Historic Cemetery, recorded the information from all of the stones, and located the stones within the established maps for each cemetery. Forbes once said, "It may be all right to be content with what you have; never with what you are." For many years, I was content with my understanding of my faith. I was a cradle Episcopalian and, until I began EFM, believed that I knew all there was to know.

The EFM experience was unique in that all that it did not teach; it made you think about. I realized early on the format of EFM was not so much about teaching me as it was about improving me.

I have improved! I firmly believe that I am better able to discover the intent of biblical passages and feel confident that I can stand on my own while dialoguing with others on the interpretation or intention of passages so often quoted and taken out of context.

Through EFM I have learned all I wanted to know about circumcision, the cycle of disobedience, smite and repent, and what it means to flagellate. I take with me the techniques of centering prayers, the ability to reflect on everyday events that elate me and deflate me, and to be still and discern God's call.

I want to thank all of my EFM Mentors: Mary, Steve, Elizabeth and Vicki. For my remaining classmates, thank you and stay prayed up. To my fellow graduates, Linda and Diane, our walk together has been a lifetime memory.

THE FUTURE OF THE RECTORY by Thomas Lackey, Vestry Member

Our rectory is a beautiful building which was built in 1829 and has housed many a rector for Holy Trinity over the years. It has served that purpose well. However, in present times, rectors want their own independent housing, often to build equity for retirement. On Tuesday, July 17, some parishioners met for the first time as a Rectory Preservation Group. In attendance were Craig Ryan, Curt Reiber, Bonnie Branham, Harold Sandy and Tom Lackey. The purpose of the meeting was to begin to think about future uses of the rectory and how it might be altered to fit the changing needs of Holy Trinity.

The present rectory contains small rooms for our youth groups and other meetings as well as a tiny office for the assistant rector and a make-shift parking area. There are plumbing, electrical and structural concerns, as well.

The Day School, as part of its Long Term Planning, has suggested some alternative ideas which could redesign the rectory in a way to be mutually beneficial to Holy Trinity and the Day School. Some of the options would include building a large conference room and a large youth meeting room where the present "porch" exists on the east side of the rectory. The Church Office would also be consolidated into a renovated rectory. All work would have to be approved by the County and the Historic Society of Prince George's County. Any changes to the rectory will cost a significant amount, to be funded by a joint venture of the Church and the Day School. There may be grant money available from the Maryland Historic Society which could defray some of the cost.

This is all in the developmental stage right now and no final decisions have been made. However, this is a great time to be thinking of future uses for the rectory, working with the Day School to meet mutually beneficial goals, and discussing how to fund our share of any cost for a final project.

The next meeting of the Rectory Preservation Group will be on Tuesday, August 14 at 7:30 PM in the rectory. All interested persons are encouraged to attend. There will be future announcements of developments in this area and a Sunday Discussion session sometime in the Fall to elaborate on these matters.
