### TAKE TIME OUT! FOR AN ADVENT RETREAT

By the time December rolls around we may feel caught on a runaway train, steaming ever faster toward Christmas and the New Year. While our secular calendars remind us how many shopping days there are 'til Christmas, our Advent calendars speak of a time of waiting and watching for new birth. As Christians we are called to pause in our head-long rush toward the holidays, and wait in quiet anticipation for the coming of Jesus.

One way to take a break from hectic holiday preparation is to participate in an Advent Retreat on Saturday, December 11, in the Rectory. The Rev. Mariann Babnis will lead participants in a contemplative reading of the four Gospels for Advent.

The day will be structured around the ancient art of *lectio divina* - a slow, contemplative praying of the Scriptures that enables the Bible, the Word of God, to become a means of union with God. Each gospel is read out three times, followed by a period of silence where all may journal and/or meditate on God's Word. Then the group joins together to share how the scripture has spoken to each of them. The day will begin and end with a prayer service.

The Advent Retreat will run from 9:00 a.m. until 3:00 p.m. Participants are asked to bring their own lunches. Beverages and snacks will be served. Since space is limited sign-up will be on a first-come, first-served basis for a total of 12 members. New areas of funding requests include additional financing for the funding for the position of youth minister, increased support for Sunday School, mission and evangelism programs, and reserves for building repairs such as the roof, and improvements such as electrical upgrades.

The Vestry at its meeting in early January, will adopt a budget based on a prioritized list of requests matched with the financial commitments made for 2005. The approved budget will then be reviewed with the congregation at the annual meeting.

### ADVENT IS THE FIRST SUNDAY OF CHURCH YEAR

As the Thanksgiving meal is cleared, many folks begin to think of Christmas shopping and the busy times ahead as the world counts down to Christmas Day. But for the Church, the countdown begins on that Sunday, the first day of the Advent Season (and the first Sunday of the church year). This is the beginning of the season of waiting, of peaceful contemplation, and of preparing ourselves and our Church community for the fulfillment of God's promises.

Purple is the Color of Advent – Beginning on the first Sunday in Advent, the color of the hangings on the altar will be purple, as they are in Lent. In this instance, purple is the color of penance and repentance as well as the symbol of the coming of the King. Our liturgy will change and the themes of waiting, of the Kingdom that is here and of the Kingdom that is coming, and community and self-preparation will be manifest.

### "Sleepers Awake" is familiar hymn of Advent -

We will sing a familiar and joyful hymn, "Sleepers Awake," on that first Advent Sunday. The children of light are called to awaken to God's promise come true, the return of our Bridegroom, Christ (Matthew 25:6, 8-10). Both words and tune are familiar, but most especially, as the Bach Cantata, Wachet auf.

"Sleepers Awake," was written by Philipp Nicolai in the mid 1550's. The son of a Lutheran pastor, Nicolai was educated at university and served the church in many roles. In 1597-98, he served as pastor in Unna, Germany. The town became a victim of the plague, which took the lives of 1,400 inhabitants. The scene of continual burials in the church cemetery deeply saddened Nicolai. He turned to Augustine's, *The City of God*, and the contemplation of eternal life. He published a treatise called "Joyful Mirror of the Eternal Life" which contained our hymn. It also contained, "O Morning Star", another vastly popular hymn.

### Wreath and Jesse Tree as symbols of Advent -

There shall come forth a shoot from the stump of Jesse. Isaiah 11:1. Something different for Advent? A Jesse Tree?

Advent wreaths are a common symbol for keeping the season in Christian homes and churches, with a candle lighted on each of the four Sundays of Advent and one in the center on Christmas.

Another way of marking the days of this special season is to make a Jesse Tree. It is one decorated with symbols that portray the spiritual heritage of Jesus. There are symbols for each day and they recount the many stories that make up the Promise.

The Jesse Tree was one of my children's favorites. On the Saturday after Thanksgiving, we would cut a small bush with lots of branches and place it in a colorful pot to hold the 29 ornaments. It would stand desolate and bare until, day by day as we told the stories and hung the colorful ornaments, it came to life as a wonderful symbol of the Light coming into the barrenness of our world and a wonderful way for people to hear the stories of God's interaction with His people!

Books available on symbols of Advent - There are small books available that contain the symbols and stories ready to cut out and hang on a small tree. They can be purchased through Holy Trinity's web site at the virtual bookstore and through the internet. Doing a search on Google gave me many sites such as <a href="https://www.cresourcei.org/jesse.html">www.cresourcei.org/jesse.html</a> to visit that have interesting ideas for making and using Jesse Trees as well as the stories and symbols.

### HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE VESTRY

Additional funding for noon service - The Vestry in the ongoing process of living into Holy Trinity's Mission - "Building an open community that connects people to God and their ministries", supported expanding the noon service to twice a month and unanimously approved adding approximately \$3,000 to the current year's budget for the organization and the musical support necessary for the service.

Local advertising during Lent -The Vestry is considering a Diocesan offer to provide local advertising during the Lenten Season at local theaters during intermission . The cost of the ads produced by the diocese, and customized for Holy Trinity would be shared with the Diocese, and any local churches that would be interested.

Evangelism program in January - The vestry has endorsed the Via Media Episcopal evangelism program to be run here in Jan. through March. The Via Media program is an eight-week series of meetings that explores the basics of Christian faith and specific aspects of the Anglican way. Each session includes a video presentation that features a round table discussion on the chosen subject of the night by noted Anglican pastors, theologians and lay people with a wide diversity of ethnicity and backgrounds. After the film there will be small-group time where questions are welcomed and discussed.

**New church sign** -The Building and Grounds and the Evangelism ministries are looking at various signs for the church. The key consideration is visibility, but other considerations are cost, attractiveness, changeable letters or fixed, landscaping, and lighting. Look for an upcoming Sunday Discussion period to discuss as more details are known.

### Holy Trinity supports Interfaith Coalition of PG

County, - The Interfaith Action Communities (IAC) has re-organized under a new governance organization call the Interfaith Coalition of Prince George's County. It will continue to be a place for faith and local interest groups to join together to tackle issues of social justice and local concerns in the county.

Holy Trinity has taken part in the formation of the Interfaith Coalition. The vestry approved Holy Trinity's becoming a member and agreed to annual dues of \$750. If you are interested in the work of this ministry, and would like to know more, or see this as a group to be involve with, please see Fr. Tom, or Gerry for details.

Increase in Professional Staff -Based on recommendations made in the Strategic Plan, and after considering the needs of the parish, the Personnel and Administration Ministry has concluded that it is necessary to increase Holy Trinity's professional staff size. Fr. Tom Andrews and the P&A Ministry are in the process of determining in what areas additional staff should be added. The Finance Ministry and the Stewardship Ministry will also be involved as they are beginning work on the 2005 budget.

### Holy Trinity's support asked in court action -

The Vestry is considering a request made by the plaintiffs in a Maryland court action to show support (by signature, not financially) of an action regarding same sex relationships. The vestry discussed if signatures meant individual support or group support; as well as whether support implied agreement. No decision was reached, and discussion was tabled pending diocesan guidance, as the request had been sent to the diocese as well.

### SECURITY AND ADVENT

Since 9/11 "security" has been made much of by politicians and others seeking to make us feel safe. But when have Christians been promised physical security? In the early Church it is evident that they did not even expect it! Their security, their true life, was rooted in God; and neither the daily insecurities of the decaying Roman Empire, nor the organized persecution which followed later, could affect their basic confidence.

The description which Christ gave of the days that were to come before his return is more accurately reproduced today in this fear-ridden age than ever before in human history. Of course we do not know the times and the seasons, but at least we can refuse to be deceived by the current obsession for physical security in the here-and-now.

While we continue to pray and work for the spread of the Kingdom in this transitory world, we know that its center of gravity is not here at all. When God decides that the human experiment has gone on long enough, yes, even in the midst of what appears to us confusion and incompleteness, Christ will come again.

This is what the New Testament teaches. This is the message of Advent. It is for us to be alert, vigilant and industrious, so that his coming will not be a terror but an overwhelming joy.
