NEW GARDEN COMMITTEE FORMED

Holy Trinity understands that one of the blessings we have is our wonderful church grounds. Because of this a Garden Committee has been formed that met on June 20. It will seek the approval of the Buildings and Grounds Committee to develop a proposal for a Prayer/Healing Garden. The proposed Garden will be on the West and Southwest side of the church with a "Spiritual Path" to travel around the graveyard and connect the garden with the Conservation Path.

Two important tasks were recognized. One was to create a Garden Guild to maintain existing and future gardens at Holy Trinity and the other is to seek funding for the Prayer/Healing Garden endeavor. The committee will write a proposal to the TKF Foundation's - Open Spaces, Sacred Places program that is due on October 1, for funding on January 15, 2005.

TKF is a private foundation in Annapolis that funds various garden projects such as The Healing Garden at Anne Arundel Memorial Medical Center and the Labyrinth and Memorial Garden at St. Luke's in Bethesda.

As music leader for the noon service I would like to say many thanks to the musicians who have committed major time (and major practice!) preparing the music for our noon service.

HYMN HISTORY

Many years ago, I found a Graceful poem in *Unity Magazine*, a poem composed of various lines of scripture where God expresses love for each of us as individuals and promises us we need not fear because our God will be there for us. A wonderful poem for those times when God seems far away – all the love and promises in one place! The hymn for this month is similar in that it repeats the “Scripture Promises,” the original title of *How Firm a Foundation*.

This hymn was published in 1787 in a hymnbook edited by John Rippon, an English Baptist minister. The author was listed as “K” as he did not wish to be known. Musicologists have since attributed it to Robert Keene, Rippon’s assistant.

Printed above the first stanzas of the hymn as it originally appeared were words from 2 Peter 1:4, “Exceeding great and precious promises.” Each stanza speaks of a different promise found in God’s word. The last stanza is a paraphrase of Hebrews 13:5b-6.

The tune was published in 1837 in *Union Harmony*. The composer was William Caldwell and he called the tune Foundation. The hymn was well-known and often heard being sung at campfires during the Civil War. It was a favorite of Andrew Jackson who asked that it be sung at his deathbed. It was also sung at the funerals of Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson.

Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have summoned you by name; you are mine...Isaiah 43

Liturgical Question of the Month - What is a Collect?

A Collect, pronounced with the emphasis on the first syllable, means what it looks like – to collect (emphasis on the second syllable) us together or to gather, our thoughts around God and worship.

To quote *Opening the Prayer Book* by Jeffrey Lee, “the first act of the eucharist is when we gather.” Here at Holy Trinity, we gather with a processional hymn, an acclamation “which declares in whose name we gather”, and for this Easter season, the Gloria. The presider’s greeting, *The Lord be with you*, our response, and the words, *Let us Pray*, invite us to offer up our prayers. Then the presider and the words of the Collect bring us “into a common act of prayer.” The Collect takes our individual concerns and cares and brings us into one corporate body. It has 3 parts: an address to God, a petition, and a doxology. The Collect is not there to set a “theme” for the day, but rather to bring us together before God.
