GROUNDWORK

Groundwork is coming in Lent. “Groundwork” is a program to help us understand that we are a missionary church. It’s a practical and theological resource for Lenten reflection and congregational development and transformation.

Considering congregational development as the basis for a Lenten series makes sense, because it is a natural time for gathering to learn and to pray. Lent is a time when, in the Episcopal Church, we take stock and go into a mode of reflection.

While many people practice individual disciplines, such as giving something up or taking on some new activity, this will enable us to reflect together on our mission and evangelism efforts.

Each chapter of “Groundwork” begins by setting the theme of the Sunday’s readings and then offers reflections from various voices on those readings. This takes a new approach to congregational mission and vitality focusing on the covenants and commitments that people of faith fulfill for effectiveness and faithfulness.

We will begin on Sunday, March 5th, and continue on the following Sundays of Lent.

VESTRY NEWS

Tom Lackey, Vestry Member Vestry Meeting of January 19, 2006

- Vestry Members were reminded that they are to work within the cluster groups assigned for them, rather than necessarily within only one ministry. This was an adjustment to the Strategic Plan under which we are operating, which change was approved at a prior meeting.
- Church-wide meeting of the cluster groups will take place on the morning of Saturday, April 22nd. Improved communications will be the theme for the morning.
- Nominations committee reported that all vestry members whose terms are to expire this year have agreed to run for another term. All are eligible to do so,.
- The Annual Meeting will be on March 5th after the 9:30 a.m. service.
- Tom Lackey gave a Stewardship update. Pledges presently amount to \$216,000. A final amount was projected to be \$230,000.
- Gerry Perez reviewed the December and end-of-the-month financials. All were pleased to note a small surplus. The proposed budget for 2006 was then discussed. There was a projected deficit for the year, but because of the retirement of the rector, it was difficult to forecast exact transition expenses. The vestry passed the budget for 2006. All agreed that church growth and prudent management of available funds would be even more important in 2006.
- John Kunkle of the Day School Board of Governors provided information as to the current activities of the Day School. The next Board/Vestry Visitation Day is scheduled for Wednesday, February 8th. This day allows the vestry to join with the Board of Governors for a full-day tour of both campuses while school is in session.

- Craig Ryan stated that the work on the new Church sign was ready to begin. The actual construction should not take long, but there may be a delay in getting BG&E personnel out to do its electrical work.
- A Parish Registry is maintained which is the book holding the official listing of all births, deaths, marriages and other significant events within the congregation. Prior books have been given to the Maryland State Archives to all access for research purposes. A motion was passed by the vestry to submit the Registry Book for the Years 1880 to 1910 to the Archives.

Stewardship From Our Youth

Having just celebrated the first anniversary of my ordination to the priesthood, I am reflecting on how I am living into this new identity. The bishop's laying-on-of-hands does not automatically confer wisdom and holiness on the new priest!

While three years in seminary offer multiple avenues for discernment and formation I have to agree with a fellow priest's statement: "The seminary doesn't teach you how to be a priest; it teaches you how to think like a priest. The parish makes you a priest." Since this friend is also one of the wisest people I know I have taken his words to heart.

How is Holy Trinity making me a priest? Well, that's what I'm attempting to find out, along with a group of parishioners. Recently I created a Formation Committee, based on the model of the seminarian's committee that helps the individual understand the parish, and be integrated into a church's life. We will explore such topics as our journeys of faith, assumptions about the role of the priest in a congregation, how a new Assistant fits into the parish structure, and how priest and parishioners work together to further the kingdom of God.

The Formation Committee is charting new territory in clergy-church relations, not only at Holy Trinity but in the wider Episcopal Church. Weekly on the Internet, I receive an epistle titled "From Where I Stand," written by a Sister Joan Chittester for the "National Catholic Reporter." This week she has written about giving and how, when we live in a 90-mile-an-hour society that keeps us apprised of the news at a rate which nearly passes human comprehension, we all too often lose contact with our fellow humans who most need our help. In essence, we are simply overwhelmed. For example, twelve coal miners died, buried deep inside a mine in West Virginia. The tragedy wasn't just the twelve miners, but also their families and relatives and it was followed in overwhelming detail. The world focused on that small town in West Virginia. Judge Alito began his confirmation/confrontation hearings before Congress. Soldiers and citizens in Iraq and Afghanistan were blown up by suicide bombers; there are famines and genocide.....

We are pounded with this ongoing and most often horrific news 24 hours a day if we but desire to listen and honestly, like you, I quite literally get overwhelmed.

Then we remember: Whoops! I forgot about the tsunami in Asia and the earthquake in Pakistan. Oh yeah, and there was Katrina too.

Chittester goes on to say, "It may not be human compassion we lack, after all. Maybe what we lack is simply the organizational structures it takes to go on donating our nickels week after week, year after year.

"Imagine what could happen for people if every business, every parish, every religious community, every institution – every family – made it to a point to identify a need and then, on

“You want a copy of that picture?” Copying Pictures from the Internet

Here’s the scenario (Didn’t I start last month’s the same way? Well, as my pappy always told me, “Don’t get off a winner!” Mind you, I am assuming that some folks did read the short tutorial I wrote for the January *Tidings*. My thanks to someone who suggested that; I think it was my daughter Denice. Anyway, here we are, set to go.) Again, the person gets a call from a friend, who says, “Hey there is a good picture of you on the HTEC website.” Again, you go to your computer, get online and bring up the website. Sure enough, there, on the Pictures page, is one of the better pictures of yourself that you have seen. You suddenly realize that you don’t have a clue how to get the picture from the website to your computer. Not to worry, just follow these steps:

Select the correct picture. This may sound odd, but most of the pictures that I put on the website are “nested”. In nesting, you are shown a thumbnail picture that you can click on to get a version which is 4 times as large. Assuming that you want the larger version, click on the small one to get the larger version on-screen.

Right-click on the picture. This will bring up a dialog box. Scroll down to “Save picture as” and click on that. This will bring up a window on your screen that will have 3 fill-in spaces. At the

top of the window (1) it will allow you to fill in the “SAVE IN” space and at the bottom (2) it will have a space for the file name and (3) type.

That’s it, although you should get used to just doing one other step – jot down the file name so that if you “lose” it in the process, you can go to **Search** or **Find** (depending upon which version of Windows you have) to look for it.

The View From Mars Hill: Christianity in the Landscape of World Religions

That’s the title of a new book by Charles B. Jones, PhD., who teaches at Catholic University and is a member of St. Andrew’s Episcopal Church in College Park. Chuck will be with us to lead conversation on religious diversity in today’s world.

Quoting from the introduction to his book: “What are we, as Christians, to make of the surge in religious diversity, and how are we to respond to it?” Are other religions simply wrong, and do we need to increase our efforts in missions and evangelism to convert the others? Is this great multiplicity a desirable state of affairs, rather like biodiversity in the natural world, calling us to appreciate and foster it? Is there any way to judge whether one way is better than another, or are they all equally good options? Ought we to inculcate fidelity to a particular religion in our children, or should we simply teach them now to be intelligent consumers when they grow up and encounter the great marketplace of religions on their own?”

For Four (4) Sundays in April and May Dr. Jones will lead Discussion Hour. Join us! I have ordered a number of copies. Let me know if you would like a copy of his very readable, useful book. Having an event with the author, the publisher is giving us a break on the price.

The Absalom Jones Scholarship Fund

An annual scholarship fund honoring Absalom Jones, first African American priest in the Episcopal Church, has been established by St. Phillip's Episcopal Church in Laurel, Maryland.

The Rev. Absalom Jones (1746-1818), was born a slave in Delaware. He eventually purchased freedom for himself and his wife, taught himself to read, founded an insurance society for blacks, and nursed yellow fever victims during an epidemic in his hometown of Philadelphia. He was ordained a priest in the Episcopal Church in 1802.

The first two scholarships of \$1,000 each will be awarded in July 2006, to individuals who have demonstrated the qualities exemplified by the Rev. Absalom Jones such as compassion, leadership, service, and interest in education.

Individuals who will be attending an institution of higher education such as a college, vocational/technical institute, or seminary and are in need of financial assistance are invited to apply by March 31, 2006. Applicants must reside, work, attend school or be a member of an Episcopal parish in the Diocese of Washington.
