## **GIVE THANKS, GIVE THANKS, GIVE THANKS!**

Sometimes I tell the young people gathered for Day School Chapels that I must sound like a broken record (not that they even know what that is!), because I am always talking about giving thanks to God. Every time we Episcopalians gather we give thanks to God. In fact that's the name of what we do when we gather. The word "Eucharist" comes from the Greek and means "grateful" or "thankful." So you can rightly say that we are a thankful people particularly as we gather around the table of our Lord to make Eucharist together.

We have so much to give thanks for here at Holy Trinity as we work our way forward in our 5-year plan. Just look at the

mention here in "The Tidings" of all the ministries forming and growing. So many more folks are involved and excited about who we are and what we are about as God's people here, "building an open community connecting people to God and their ministries." That's our mission and that's joyful, thankful work.

Canon Mary Sulerud, Assistant to Bishop Chane for Ministry and Resource Development, pointed out another illustration of our thankfulness. Mary was invited here in November to preach and chat with us by the Stewardship Ministry. In her sermon on that day, the Feast of Christ the King, she had this to say, "this community of faith [Holy Trinity] clearly means so much to those of you gathered today. What extraordinary commitments you have made in the name of Christ. Holy Trinity gives the largest percentage of its income to the Diocese of any parish [in the Diocese]. You have entered an unprecedented partnership with three other parishes to share the services of a youth minister. You have a thriving school of 600 students that is a model not only in this Diocese for good parochial education but in this region and province. Yours is one of two parish budgets that I carry

with me to other churches as an example of how to create a financial document that really reflects mission and ministry. All of this is possible because so many of you choose to give without trying to control the outcome of your gifts. All of this is possible because so many of you give, knowing what it is to be servants of a Servant-King, Jesus Christ.

"Communities of faith that are living witnesses to the great visions of Daniel and the seer John of a kingdom of priests to serve our god are rarer than any of us would wish most days. I believe with all my heart that Holy Trinity is just such a parish. On this feast day I would challenge all of you to cherish this reality not by trying to continue life just as it is, but by exuberantly and joyfully offering your lives, separately and gathered, to Christ as King not only of heaven and earth but of at least 10 percent of your time, talent and treasure as starters. It will be the beginning of a vision that the other 90 percent is about God's rule too. Paraphrasing Harvard Chaplain, Peter Gomes, it will also launch us gloriously into a life in which 'giving is its own excuse for living'."

What a great challenge to us as we begin this new year, this new year of thanksgiving to God for all that we have been given. Pray that you may be that kind of steward of God's gifts.

## **UPDATE ON THE SEARCH FOR THE NEXT HEAD OF HOLY TRINITY EPISCOPAL DAY SCHOOL**

A group of current Board members has come together to form an ad hoc/consultant search committee. The group has met four times since Peggy announced her retirement. As of this writing they have:

- Contacted both resources in the education community for consultant recommendations and schools who have recently been through a head search or who are currently searching for a new head.
- From these sources developed a list of highly recommended consultants.
- Contacted the consultants to ask them to send a proposal for a head search.

The group is currently reviewing these proposals, asking for additional information, comparing and contrasting the proposals and developing an interview process for the consultants. Our goal is to present consultants to the full Board in January in order to have a consultant hired by the end of January.

We ask for your good thoughts and prayers as we begin the first step in the search for a new Head for Holy Trinity Episcopal Day School.

## WORSHIP AND MUSIC MINISTRY

Worship and Music Ministry met Nov 16.

There was a suggestion that a sermon title might appear in the bulletin along with questions for contemplation. A follow-up Sunday Discussion might consider the questions. Music and Worship will be reading the book entitled *Opening the Prayerbook* by Jeffrey Lee. Volume 7 of *The Church's Teaching Series*, this is a resource for better understanding *The Book of Common Prayer* and the very important work we do as Episcopalians when we

worship. Following are the discussion questions for the first chapter.

### Chapter 1: What is Common Prayer?

1. This chapter addresses the question of what is common prayer. How would you describe the defining characteristics of common prayer? What would "uncommon" prayer look like?

2. The author describes Anglicans as "people of a book." Do you agree with this description? What are some of the advantages of having a prayer book? What are some of the disadvantages?

3. Lee asserts that "one of the challenges facing Anglicanism world-wide is the increasing diversity of its prayer books." How do you think the recent abundance of prayer book revisions have affected your congregation? Your own faith?

A request has been made for a candle light service Christmas Eve. This will be done by turning out the lights for the last hymn, and having candles passed out to the congregation by the ushers as they return from Communion.

On Christmas Eve the acolytes will accompany the Gospeler, "enlightening" the Gospel procession when everyone turns to face the book as it is being read.

For next year, we should consider holding the Christmas pageant before Dec. 25<sup>th</sup>, not after. Also next year when Christmas falls on Sunday we should consider having only one service, perhaps at 10 am, since we will have had services on Friday, Saturday, and then again on Sunday. We will talk more about these ideas.

New hymns could be taught by having the choir singing the hymn as an anthem and then using the hymn at the service several times.

Palm Sunday's liturgy in the Book of

Common Prayer moves us into Holy Week and Jesus' Passion because fewer people are able to attend weekday services, and we need to remember the Passion before we move into the celebration of Easter and the Resurrection.

## HYMN HISTORY By Arleen D. Kirtland

*One of the most beautiful and well-loved hymns of the Advent and Christmas season is "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." Written by a monk or priest sometime before 800 AD, it is rich in Old and New Testament references to the unfolding biblical prophecies fulfilled by Christ's birth. It was originally sung, one verse at a time, as a vespers antiphon during the one week celebration of Advent observed by the early church. For the ordinary person worshiping in the Dark Ages, this hymn gave life to the story of salvation.*

*The Latin chant was discovered by a scholarly and somewhat progressive Anglican priest, John Mason Neale, in the mid 1800's. He translated the verses into English and set them to a 15<sup>th</sup> century church processional chant.*

*Some of the scriptures used for the verses are Isaiah 7:14, Matthew 1:23, Isaiah II (the Road of Jesse), Malachi 4:2, and Isaiah 22:22.*

*Our hymn of praise for Christmas is "Angels We Have Heard on High." This is a carol whose origins cannot be traced – we know nothing of the writer. Scholars believe it came from France,*

around the nineteenth century. It was first published in a French songbook in 1855, although it was most likely used by the church for years.

The chorus comes from the earliest of Latin chants and ties the hymn to all of church history. The phrase, *Gloria in excelsis Deo* – Glory to God in the highest – was decreed around 130 AD by Pope Telesphorus to be said or sung at the conclusion of celebrations of the day of Christ's birth. By the 3<sup>rd</sup> century, this had become tradition.

The verses of this hymn are a simple yet moving retelling of the angels appearing to the ordinary shepherds, some of the first called to spread the Good News, in a glorious proclamation of God's promise fulfilled. Each of us, like the common shepherds, have been called by Christ to be one of His Saints and to be about the business of spreading the gospel, not only at Christmas, but throughout our lives.

The stories behind these hymns and many other favorites can be found in *Stories Behind the Best-Loved Songs of Christmas* by Ace Collins. I highly recommend this book for light devotional reading, for yourself or as "family time."
