## Vestry Retreat Highlights

On Saturday, May 14, the Holy Trinity vestry spent the day in our annual retreat. It was a beautiful spring day, with bright sunshine and warm summer temperatures. Over 70% of the vestry attended, resisting the lure of the pleasant day. The time was productive, and included Bob Laurenson and Evelyn Kirby from the Communications Ministry, as we focused on Communications and Transition.

We began by outlining our spiritual autobiography, and getting to know each other. It was clear that we had each had felt the Holy Spirit in our lives, as we found our way to our present lives. Bob and Evelyn next walked us through the various communication channels we use here at Holy Trinity. We talked about our target audience, and how effective the channels were in reaching and informing everyone. The conclusions were that some things were right, some need improvement, but that Holy Trinity is doing a better job of getting timely information into the congregation. The best channel is our Tidings, which has gone from about 35 days between article submissions and home delivery, to the current 12 days. A remarkable 200% improvement!!

We next reviewed the ministry areas, brainstormed ideas for improved communications, and talked about ways to improve the ministry areas/cluster structure.

Mariann Babnis led a session on Churches in Transition. We discussed several models for transition, and discussed ways to improve transition and pitfalls to avoid. This tied in well with the morning's session on communication.

Everyone agreed that the day was well worth it, and we are excited about working together in 2005-2006.

Try it, you'll like it.

**With the launch of the “Seattle Statement” I want to share with you the announcement of the completion of the study document entitled *Mary: Grace and Hope in Christ*.**

In an emotional statement last year commemorating the 40th anniversary of the Vatican Statement on Ecumenism, Pope John Paul II stated that one of the pastoral priorities of his pontificate had been the promotion of Christian unity. In his remarks he said, “ecumenical unity is...not just some sort of appendix but is based on God’s saving plan to gather all Christians into unity.”

More recently Rowan Williams, Archbishop of Canterbury, remarked after his first encounter with Pope Benedict XVI that he was encouraged by two things. First, he said that Pope Benedict spoke about being “servants of unity” and underlined the importance of ecumenical work. Second, the Pope preached at his inaugural Mass on the theme of united Christian witness, a witness to the fact that the Gospel does not ask us to become less than human but more deeply human.

On May 16, the Archdiocese of Seattle hosted members of a formal international dialogue between the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches who have answered the call of our church leaders to strive for unity. The occasion for this gathering was the completion of an important document called *Mary: Grace and Hope in Christ* that sets out an agreed framework for understanding Mary in the Christian faith. The document is referred to as the Seattle Statement.

In March of 1966 following the Second Vatican Council, Pope Paul VI and the Archbishop of Canterbury Michael Ramsey acknowledged in a Common Declaration that the Holy Spirit “has created a new atmosphere of Christian fellowship between the Roman Catholic Church and the churches of the Anglican Communion.” In obedience to this declaration, which resulted in creation of ARCIC [Anglican Roman Catholic International Commission] in 1970, our churches began efforts to re-establish complete communion of faith and sacramental life.

By attempting in the spirit of Philippians 3:13 – “to forget what lies behind and strain forward to what lies ahead” – the dialogues have helped us discover each other’s faith. As a result, we have reached many agreements on matters that once caused division between our respective churches.

Grounded in Scripture and the ancient common tradition, ARCIC’s method of dialogue has led repeatedly to the discovery of common faith expressed in doctrinal agreements. We have reached these agreements by avoiding the emotional language of past disputes and instead pursuing a restatement of doctrine in light of changed times and conditions.

A special consultation of Anglican and Roman Catholic bishops in 2000 specifically asked ARCIC for a study of Mary in the life and doctrine of the Church. Since that time, ARCIC has met on five occasions to reach agreement on this central aspect of Christian faith.

The fruit of five years of dialogue, patient listening, study and prayer together, the Seattle Statement is not an authoritative declaration by the Catholic Church or the Anglican Communion. Instead, it is a document that invites the reader to follow the path that led us to our conclusion, and it is submitted to both churches for further study, dialogue and prayer on the role of Mary in the doctrine and life of the Church.

Throughout our dialogues, Mary, the mother of our Lord Jesus Christ, stood before us as one who calls us into unity with Jesus Christ. By her faithful response to the will of God and through her human life and obedient acceptance of Christ’s abundant grace, she reinforced for us the role of our own humanity in the task of discovering the reason for our hope in Christ.

Upon completion of our work, my sincere hope is that this document reflects Mary’s example of obedience to God’s will. I know it was born of our efforts to obey the call, so frequently expressed by our respective leaders, to seek what we hold in common and to celebrate the important traditions of our shared heritage.

Hymn History

*And when he had said this, he  
breathed on them, and said to them,  
"Receive the Holy Spirit." John  
20:22*

Having celebrated the "birthday of the Church," that is, the Feast of the Pentecost, we have been reminded of the power of the Holy Spirit to inspire and guide us in building the body of believers. One Anglican priest, Edwin Hatch, was so inspired by Jesus' words in John 20:22 that he wrote *Breathe on Me* a hymn expressing his desire that he be included in Jesus' blessing on his disciples (hymn 508 in our hymnal).

Hatch was one of England's greatest theologians in the second half of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. He served as a professor at many colleges and universities in England and Canada. He was well-known for his religious poems, which in the words of one commentator were "a beautiful supplement to his theology." This hymn certainly expresses Hatch's deepest aspirations to serve our Lord fully.

Many hymn writers have been inspired by this verse in the Gospel of John. Charles Wesley echoes the lines in his hymn, *Love Devine, All Loves Excelling*. Another hymn written by Bessie Head in 1914, *O Breath of Life*:

*O Breath of life, come sweeping  
through us,  
And move within us while we pray;  
O Breath of life, come, cleanse, renew  
us,  
And fit Thy church to meet this hour.  
Amen!*

## Bowie Crop Walk 2005 Another Great Success

Our thanks to Tanisha and Wade Brown for representing Holy Trinity in this year's Crop Walk, making it possible for us to once again participate with other Bowie churches in this important event. This husband and wife team were accompanied by their two doggies, on a perfect weather walking day. Not sure who tired out first but they all made it to the finish line together.

Wade and Tanisha wish to thank all their sponsors for their generous support. Due to everyone's efforts, \$500.00 here at Holy Trinity was raised, the largest amount for us in our eight years of Bowie Crop Walks. 25% of all the monies collected will go to the Bowie Pantry and the rest will go to Church World Services (CWS).

CWS is a cooperative ministry of 36 denominations providing disaster relief, supporting self help programs and advocacy for the neediest in the world. A few examples are: 50,000 more people have access to clean water due to CWS well digging in Africa, Asia and South America; Aids prevention programs established in Africa; in the wake of 9/11

provided trauma and grief counseling in New York City; and provided relief in Afghanistan/Pakistan border with Shelter kits and food parcels to uprooted families; care of street children in Argentina: health and school kits to the children in Iraq, Liberia, Senegal and the Dominican Republic.
