- Referrals to medical and other support services
- Arrange and monitor in-home care
- Counseling during periods of stress, transition, and illness.

EDUCATION FOR MINISTRY

Does the name of this class scare you? It did me when Tom told me about it in 1998 and said

that he thought I would enjoy it. My response was to think: "Ministry???" But I am not going to be ordained! Why do I need this class?" I was interested and curious enough to enroll that year and for three years after and graduated from the course in 2002.

Education for Ministry (EFM) opened my mind and my heart to many things. I especially liked its premise that we are all called to serve; to be ministers by virtue of our baptism. We are called to serve in His name. What shape our ministry will take is difficult to discern in the day-to-day busy lives we lead. EFM opens the way to begin the journey: what will my walk with Christ be like and what does that mean in my daily life?

Raised as a Roman Catholic, the Bible was a book I had not read. We studied biblical stories in my religion classes and we heard the bible read on Sunday in Mass, but I had never *read* the Bible. I had also never thought of myself as someone who had a call to ministry. I thought if I followed the Ten Commandments, went to Mass on Sunday and in general behaved myself then my place in heaven was reserved and waiting.

In EFM, I read and studied the Bible, and learned about church history, various theologians and theologies. Through theological reflection, a particular process used in EFM, I realized how all of these things and more impacted my daily life. I am still attempting to discern what is next for me on my journey. I don't think I will ever know

exactly what I am to do but that is okay now as long as I keep moving forward on the journey (with pitfalls here and there –you know...sin ...followed by blessed forgiveness and redemption!)

In this year's EFM class there are 11 participants: 4 Year One studying the Old Testament, 3 Year Two focusing on the New Testament and 3 Year Three students with a concentration on church history. Steve Cone and I are co-mentoring the class. We are very impressed with the EFM class participants. They are faithfully reading their chapters, actively participating in the group discussions and learning to reflect theologically on scripture text or on everyday situations.

Hymn History – by Arleen Dale Kirtland

What would Easter Sunday be without ***Jesus Christ is Risen Today*** being sung? Like *Silent Night* and so many others, this hymn is **tradition** for those of us brought up in the church.

In the 18th century, the first translation of *Jesus Christ is Risen Today* appeared in a well-known songbook entitled *Lyra Davidica*. The translator and original author of the hymn are unknown. We do know the hymn was written in Latin during the 14th century, prior to the Reformation, and was widely sung throughout Europe.

One of the interesting features of the hymn as it appeared in *Lyra Davidica* was that the word, "Alleluia," followed each phrase of the hymn. The word "**Alleluia**" is from the Hebrew, meaning, "*praise ye the Lord.*" From the earliest days of The Way, that is, Christianity, we have greeted one another on Easter Day with "Alleluia, the Lord is risen!" Just as now, the word was in frequent use in liturgies and hymns to glorify God for the mighty deeds He has done for us. Note also that the words reflect both cross and grave in balance with resurrection as we exult in this mightiest of God's work!

Once again, we find the hand of the Wesleys, Charles to be exact, in the version we know of the hymn. He wrote the stanza beginning, "Sing we to our God above."

The tune we sing today has come down through the centuries with subtle changes. It is known as *Easter Hymn* and was recorded in *The Complete Psalmodist* by John Arnold in 1749. Could Handel have written the melody, or perhaps another composer named Worgan? Historians haven't been able to answer that question in spite of the fact that this hymn was so important in its day – it's unusual for there to be no record of the writer or composer of so popular a piece.

One of my sources for the story of this hymn is KAPELLE Music (Hymn Stories 1997). To quote them, "On [Easter] morning, imagine yourself singing collectively with the entire Body of Christ as together we praise our risen Lord!" Praise Him, all ye heavenly host, Alleluia!

Question of the month: What is a Gradual?

I happened to share my research results on the topic of "What is a sequence hymn" with the very man who asked the question, Dr. Chuck Mock, our wonderful substitute organist, and he came up with another telling question. What is a *Gradual*, indeed!

Graduals are psalms sung by the choir alternately with readings from the Bible. This custom is as old as the readings themselves as singing psalms at that place in the service is an inheritance from the synagogues. Alternate readings and whole psalms made up the first part of the liturgy from the beginning of Christianity. Over time custom dictated that these psalms be sung or said by various deacons or sub-deacons and be said or sung in very specific spots in the church, some higher than others! This was all part of an elaborate processional prior to the reading of the Gospel. Thus this particular psalm became the *Gradual*, as that was the name for the altar steps where the reader/chanter stood! At times, the people were given a response to repeat at the end of verses, a custom maintained in Roman Catholic churches today. During the Great Vigil of Easter, the choir leads us in this type of response singing of psalms.

SEARCH FOR NEXT HEAD OF HOLY TRINITY EPISCOPAL DAY SCHOOL

An update

The Board of Governors appointed a search committee on March 11th. Led by Mary Ryan, the Search Chair, the members are: Reverend Tom Andrews, Alison Lavigne, Stephanye Maxwell, Cathy Nyce, James Robinson, and Kathy Murphy. All are Board members and all are parents of children in the school currently or who attended in the past.

The search consultants search from Educator's Collaborative, Rev. Woodward and Mr. Bonney (Pete and Jim) interview representatives of the school community on March 17 & 18 at the school to develop a profile of the school for candidates and gain a sense of the opportunities and challenges facing a new head.

They also met with the search committee to outline their process in detail. The opening has been listed with appropriate agencies (National Association of Episcopal Schools, the Association of Independent Maryland Schools, and with The Blue Sheet, an online listing of national Head openings.)

Pete and Jim will visit the school again in Monday, May 3^d to continue interviews with faculty and to conduct meetings with the faculty and with the school community at large. Over the next two-to-three months, the search committee will meet to review the credentials of the top candidates they identify. To assure representation of the entire school community, an advisory committee will be formed that includes faculty and staff members, parents, alumni, church/vestry members and other community members. This committee will interview all the candidates invited to visit the school and will share their impressions about these candidates with the search committee.

We continue to ask for your good thoughts and prayers as we search for the next Head of Holy Trinity Episcopal Day School. If you have
