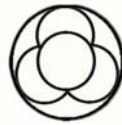

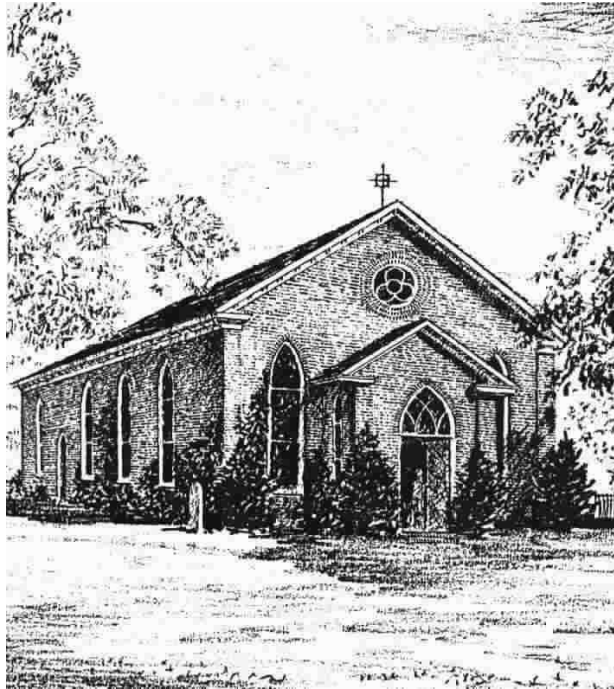

Holy Trinity – The Challenges Ahead by Rev. Bruce McPherson, Interim Rector

For this edition of the Tidings, I would like to depart from the usual seasonal reflection and review the discussion about Holy Trinity that was part of the Annual Meeting. This is for those who were not able to attend; for those who were, but have forgotten; and for me, that I might clarify and document my own thinking about Holy Trinity and its very promising future.

First, and most important, the current trends do not give one a burst of optimism. Here are some facts:

- Attendance at Sunday services is on a downward trend and has been for a number of years. Average Sunday attendance was 198 in the year 2000 and 167 last year and has decreased almost every year since 1998.
- Sunday School enrollment was 176 in 2000 and is 42 this year.
- The Youth Group has suffered a number of disappointments and this year there is only one child enrolled in Rite 13. There are no candidates for confirmation.
- Pledge income is up generally over the years, but the number of pledges is down. In 2000, there were 132 pledges; and this year, 119.

These trends are the result of a number of factors, but whatever the case, the central issue for us is what are we to do about it. It is not sufficient to say that we will wait for a new Rector. This is the work of the people of Holy Trinity. And it means that we can't keep doing the same things over and over.

For my part, I intend to initiate three ventures that will not of themselves change matters, but may create a momentum for change. They are:

- The Rectory – The Rectory is badly in need of restoration and the Day School is badly in need of space. Therefore the Vestry has approved a joint venture with the Day School to explore the renovation of the Rectory into offices for the Church and meeting space for both Church and Day School. That work has begun with the authorization of an architect to evaluate the current condition of the building.
- Pastoral Care – The Pastoral Care Committee has been quite active and will, I expect, be even more so. The Committee is anxious to reinvigorate its ministry with the commissioning of Eucharistic Visitors and closer attention to our elderly members, many of whom are not able to get to church. I also expect that we will be able to expand Holy Trinity's healing ministry by offering the laying on of hands for healing at every service. It is one of the Church's oldest and most honored traditions.
- Racial Reconciliation – On the night before he died, Jesus prayed for his disciples that "they may be one." It is my prayer that Holy Trinity can build on its long tradition of inclusiveness and can truly become that "city on a hill" where the term "race" has no meaning. It is, after all, a human construct, not a godly one. We must continue to build, not just numbers, but true understanding so that the dream of oneness can be realized in our time and in our place. I have been inviting a few people to join me in creating a task force that I have faith it will expand in ever widening circles of friendship.

I hope that you will support the Vestry and me in these efforts and I hope that you will always be mindful of Christ's command to preach the good news to everyone so that all may come to know the joy, peace and

"You Should Do This" (Education for Ministry) by Vicki Esmacher, EFM Comentor

I first joined the Education for Ministry (EFM) program at Holy Trinity in 1994 when Father Tom Andrews put that gentle hand on my shoulder and said, "*You should do this.*" I am sure many of you are familiar with Tom's way of encouragement! 1994 was the first year for the EFM program at Holy Trinity. I am very grateful that I made the decision to say, "Yes" to the EFM program. EFM was a life changing series of events for me. Simply put, EFM taught me that God wants me to serve. EFM opened my eyes to discovering the many ways I can do that.

Background on the EFM program: The University of the South, in Sewanee Tennessee, sponsors EFM. EFM is a program that interweaves a theological study of the Bible, church history, current events, and our everyday lives. Sounds ambitious! But it's true! It is a 4-year program, but you sign up for one "year" at a time – from September to June. We have several books that are our guides. The first year, we study the Old Testament; the second year, the New Testament; the third, church history; and the fourth, 20th century events. Students (8-12) in all 4 years of study meet together one evening a week for 2 hours. A typical evening session includes, for the first hour (after the howdy-do's), one person sharing a "theological reflection" – that is, a event from that one's life, an article from the newspaper or the internet, or an object that is meaningful, and together we relate that to our scripture readings from our week's studies. Magically, or shall I say, *spiritually*, our discussion comes together in a way that has helped me (and other EFM students) to find God's will for us – how to serve, how to minister, how to cope, how to be joyful, how to learn His ways. Infused with all this is so much fun – we laugh all the time. And, anyone you ask who has taken EFM will tell you what a great experience it is/was.

Now it's my turn to put my hand on your shoulder, "*You should do this.*"

Transitional Housing Corporation Seeks Furniture, Volunteers & Financial Support by Elizabeth Chamberlain

Wow, two years have already gone by since Holy Trinity last furnished an apartment for the Transitional Housing Corporation (www.thcdc.org). Soon, we will once again have the opportunity to assist a family in its struggle to find its way out of homelessness. Families that participate in this wonderful program are provided a furnished apartment at the TCH’s Partner Arms I or Partner Arms II apartment buildings while they complete mandatory employment and career counseling, family dynamics and parenting skills, life skills counseling, substance abuse counseling and family therapy. Currently 27 families with 62 children participate in this program. After 18 months, the families move into their own apartments, taking all their furnishings with them. The apartment is then cleaned and painted and sponsoring parishes, like Holy Trinity, refurbish the apartment for the next family.

To continue to provide this mission, we will need assistance collecting donated items, shopping for supplies, arranging the move-in day, and setting up the new apartment into move-in condition. It currently seems that our scheduled move-in date will be late June or early July. Feed The Homeless: Help Holy Trinity Make Sandwiches for Martha's Table by Chip Harman and Elizabeth Chamberlain, Hunger Committee

It is another sandwich-making Sunday at Holy Trinity: Tables stretched out in the Parish Hall with mounds of bologna, jelly, peanut butter and stacks of loaves of bread. The plastic gloves come out, bags of bread are opened up, slices of cheese and meat start getting slapped down, collected and rebagged, ready for the next round of assembly.

For Holy Trinity parishioners and the organizing members of the Hunger Committee, it is almost a monthly ritual for the past 5 years, but look past the noise and chatter and plastic bags, and what's going on? What happens to all this food?

At the end of the sandwich making session, Elizabeth Chamberlain and her husband Ken Wenzel pile the sandwiches into their car and head for Washington, DC. There, they unload the bags and boxes of food at Martha's Table, a program that provides assistance to at-risk families and individuals, dispensing more than 3,000 sandwiches, 65 gallons of soup, and 65 gallons of beverages, feeding 1,200 people **daily**. Sandwiches from Holy Trinity may find their way to McKenna's Wagon, a mobile soup kitchen that delivers as many as 1,200 meals a week.

For Martha's Table, Holy Trinity's contribution is probably absorbed quickly, so when you hear the next announcement for Sandwich-Making Sunday, bring extra loaves of bread, stacks of cheese, and jars of peanut butter and jelly. Or join in this ministry to help your fellow parishioners; grab a pair of gloves and join in yourself. The next session will be May 20.
