HYMN HISTORY

Our hymn for this month is one we sing frequently and throughout the liturgical year – *There's a Wideness in God's Mercy*.

The hymn was written by Frederick Faber (1814-1863) who was brought up as a Calvinistic Anglican and ordained in the Church of England. At the age of 31, he converted to Roman Catholicism and was re-baptized Father Wilfred. He then opened a community called the Brothers of the Will of God and later an oratory – that is, a place of prayer. Oratory often describes a musical piece uniting a Bible text with music. So Father Wilfred's place of prayer became a place to pray and sing.

At the time, British Roman Catholics did not have the rich hymn heritage that the other churches used. So Father Wilfred began writing hymns to fill that void. In hopes of having Catholics of his day become a hymn-singing people, he wrote a wide variety of hymns, including *Faith of Our Fathers*. *There's a Wideness in God's Mercy* became popular with all people of faith for its simple and beautiful expressions of faith – such as “And the heart of the Eternal/ is most wonderfully kind” - and has a variety of musical settings.

The Nicene Creed

This month let's explore the Nicene Creed. Have you ever wondered why we recite this Creed at the end of the part of the liturgy known as the Service of the Word?

In the early days of the church, professions of faith were expressions of praise for our Lord Jesus Christ. By the end of the second century, the church developed the creeds as we know them to combat various heresies and began using them as “rules of faith.” The Nicene Creed is not only such a rule, but also a summary of the gospel story. It states all that needs to be said, without frills, to describe God's

Grace through the acts of the Holy Spirit. It also ties together our baptism and our Christian life and worship.

During the Reformation, Martin Luther designated the creed as a “sacrifice of praise” once again. Saying the Creed together is our collective, praise-filled, response to the Word and a bridge to our celebration of the Eucharist.

The Honduras Committee is again selling the lovely Christmas greens and wreaths to raise funds for our companion diocese of Honduras. The gifts for your personal use will be delivered to us at Holy Trinity between 11/29 and 12/6. Direct delivery of gift greens and wreaths ordered for your friends & loved ones, along with a personalized message will arrive directly to the recipient fresh within the first two weeks after Thanksgiving.

Thanks to you for your generous support of our fundraisers in the past, the following two projects were funded during 2004:

- C \$500 - for the construction of a kitchen at the prison in Puerto Lempira.
- C \$4,000 - for the salary of Deacon Ana Rosalia Aguilar.

Ana is serving the church in San Fernando Rey in Omoa. She is married and the mother of 5 sons. Deacons in Honduras receive an annual salary of \$4,900.00 in U.S. dollars. By paying Ana to work in the church, we will be helping a Honduran citizen help her community.

Bishop Allen has asked parishes in the U.S. to commit to paying a deacon's salary for 5 years, when possible. At the end of 5 years, he believes each congregation should be able to pay its clergy without outside help. Holy Trinity has committed to one year.
